### 1987 ANNUAL MEETING

The second annual meeting of SPNHC was held at the Redpath Museum, McGill University, Montreal, May 31-June 3, 1987.

The 102 participants represented a wide range of curators, conservators, professors, collections managers and technicians involved with natural history collections in museums and universities worldwide. One delegate came from Spain, one from England, seven from western Canada (University of Victoria, Tyrrell Museum, B.C. Provincial Museum, Univ. of Manitoba, Manitoba Museum of Man & Nature), 25 from Ontario (mainly ROM and the National Museum of Natural Sciences), 35 from Quebec (the Redpath Museum, McGill University, Universite de Quebec a Montreal, Universite de Montreal, the Montreal Discovery Room), 5 from eastern Canada (Newfoundland Museum, New Brunswick Museum, Nova Scotia Agricultural College, Atlantic Geoscience Centre) and 31 from the United States (ranging from the American Museum of Natural History in the east to Bishop's Museum in the west, from the Field Museum in the north to the Anniston Museum of Natural History and Corpus Christi Museum in the south).

Twenty-five oral papers and 18 posters were presented. Keynote addresses focused on fundraising, training programmes and the state of natural history collections in Britain. Interspersed with the meetings were special demonstrations such as Encapsulation of specimen labels and Pest identification and control. The fourth day included a selection of five hands-on workshops. A post-meeting tour of the National Collections in Ottawa was offered on the fifth day.

We were pleased to host the 1987 meeting and look forward to the 1988 meeting in Pittsburgh.

# Symposium on Natural History Museums in Kansas City

"New Directions and Professional Standards" is the theme for a symposium addressing the current status and growth of natural history museums. Speakers will address topics such as whether conflicts exist between museum growth and professional standards of the museum and natural science disciplines; whether new growth improves the level of standards; whether small museums are responding to the future in the same manner as large ones; the conservation needs of natural history materials, etc.

This symposium (October 4, 1988) immediately precedes the joint annual meeting of the Mountain-Plains Museums Association and the Midwestern Museums Conference in Kansas City (Oct.5-7). Professionals are encouraged to submit individual papers for presentation at the symposium on topics relating to the philosophy and functions of natural history museums.
